The shovel is in the ground for our grand Wall of Fame project. The Wall is under construction as I write.

Our capable Guyana Wall of Fame TEAM is on the job. The Guyana TEAM is building the wall for thousands of \$\$ less than we raised – and this is just the beginning. A complete new concrete block / chain link face will surround the College grounds, and thousands of \$\$ will be left over to help Saints. All new Wall of Fame Campaigns will result in 80-90% of the funds raised going towards the school and 10-20% toward installing name plaques for new contributors.

The Wall of Fame project will eventually raise over \$100,000 CAN. Remember, we have already passed \$42,000 CAN.

Once the Wall is built, we will be gearing up for a new campaign to add more names to the Wall so that all who “missed the boat” the first time will have the opportunity of having his/her name emblazoned into a granite plaque for posterity.

It’s been a long time coming. Now it’s here. And on-going.

But we still need some help from you.

Any contributor who is willing to “top up” into the next level or above is encouraged to do so. After all it is a fund-raiser.

Contributors are also invited to subscribe towards a plaque for any members of staff of his/her choosing, and a plaque will be added when the amount received for a staff member reaches C\$ 200.00

INAUGURAL SUMMIT MEETING

In November 2003, the Toronto Executive held a one-day planning session to review the Association’s activities in providing assistance to the College. At this meeting, it became clear that the various College alumni Associations need to work together more closely to achieve their common objective. After some communications with the alumni Associations in Guyana, Barbados, and New York, the Toronto Executive decided to host a meeting of the alumni Associations and unattached alumni in Toronto in the summer of 2004.

This inaugural summit meeting is scheduled for Sun. 1 Aug., 2004, at the Tam Heather Curling & Tennis Club, 730 Military Trail, Scarborough, Ontario. This date was scheduled to take advantage of alumni visiting Toronto for the annual Caribana festival which occurs during this period and for the Guyanese alumni Associations’ Last Lap Lime event scheduled for Mon. 2 Aug., 2004.

The Agenda for the meeting is still under development, and will be based on the following objectives of the meeting :

- Create an “umbrella” organization which will coordinate the activities of the individual international Alumni Associations in their efforts to assist the College;

- Develop the rules and guidelines under which the new organization will operate;
- Identify the current most pressing needs of the College;
- Determine the measures and efforts to satisfy these immediate needs.

All college alumni are invited to attend and to contribute their suggestions for improving the work of the Associations. If you plan to be present, please let us know as early as possible (either via our web-site, www.torontosaints.com, or directly to me – see below) since this will enable us to make all the necessary arrangements for the meeting.

If any attendees need to make hotel reservations, let us know as soon as possible since we may be able to assist in negotiating for rooms with the local hotels. Early reservations are important for this time of year, since the annual Caribana festival draws many visitors from the U.S. and overseas, resulting in a scarcity of hotel rooms during this period.

IN MEMORIAM

L. A. (Bunt) Phillips

Since we last issued our newsletter, four prominent Saints' "old boys" have died. We honour them briefly in this issue.

Louis Campayne was described by a colleague as "a perfect role model, who was never one to put down or embarrass even the worst student, but always had kind words of encouragement". Louis who attended the College in the late 1940s and early 1950s, died at his home in England on 15 Sept., 2003. His ashes were brought to Toronto where his funeral service and burial took place on Fri. 3 Oct., 2003.



Vernon (Bill) Hazlewood died at his home in New York City in the last week of October 2003. From 1950 to 1957, he attended the college where he excelled not only in his academic studies but also in cricket, soccer, and track. After leaving Guyana, Bill attended Howard University, and studied economics at the undergraduate and graduate levels. He also continued his athletic activities in the U.S., representing Howard University in soccer.

Leslie Wight, who died in Toronto on Sun. 4 Jan., 2004, attended the College during the 1940s. He was one of four brothers who were all very active and successful in sports (Arnold at cricket in England, Norman representing British Guiana in cricket, soccer, and field hockey, and Darwin playing lawn tennis for the colony). Leslie himself was the premier opening batsman of his time for colony's cricket team. After moving to Toronto, Leslie continued to play cricket in the first division of the Toronto & District Cricket League in which he earned some acclaim also as a bowler in addition to his batting prowess.

Joe Castanheiro, fellow cricketer and personal friend of Les, pays tribute to this outstanding Guianese on Page 6 of this issue.

Fr. Andrew Morrison SJ died on Mon. 19 Jan., 2004, in Georgetown, Guyana, at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital where he had been admitted after complaining of exhaustion. He attended the College in the 1930s, and went to England in the 1940s to study for the priesthood. Fr. Morrison was very active in news reporting in Guyana, at one time holding the post of Editor of the Catholic Standard which he used very effectively to campaign for democracy and freedom in Guyana, winning the accolades of his peers.

SAINTS CRICKET ICON PASSES ON

George Leslie Wight, Les to his friends and the cricketing fraternity, was born on May 28th, 1929 in Georgetown. The Wight brothers, Arnold, Norman, Leslie, Peter and Darwin all attended St. Stanislaus College and the first four named went on to represent British Guyana in cricket at the intercolonial level. Les went one step further when he was selected to represent the West Indies in the Third Test Match against India at Bourda in 1953.



Leslie's first intercolonial match was against Barbados at Kensington Oval in Bridgetown in 1950. He once told me that it was a baptism of fire, as the Barbados attack was spearheaded by Frank King who had the ball whistling past his ears. There were no helmets in those days.

Les will forever be remembered for his part in a then record opening partnership of 390 with the late Glendon Gibbs against Barbados at Bourda in 1951. Gibbs made 216 and Les was 262 NOT OUT when the innings was declared closed at 692 for 9. Les batted for the better part of 2 days and in the process established a world record for continuous presence on the field of play. The record opening partnership stood for 50 years and

was eventually eclipsed in 2002. Leslie's intercolonial career spanned the years 1950 – 1953, during which time, in 12 matches, he recorded 4 centuries at an average of 72.19.

In his one and only test match, batting at the unusual number 6 spot in the order, he scored 21. Unusual because he was an opening batsman and, for reasons only the captain knew, Jeff Stollmeyer elected to open the innings with Bruce Pairaudeau, much to Les' dismay and chagrin. Shortly after the Test Series was over, Les decided to emigrate to Canada.

In 1953, Les married Elaine (da Silva) and they produced a family of 4 sons. A devoted husband and father, Les somehow found the time to pursue his lifelong love – cricket. Not one to talk too much about the game, he was however an ardent student of the game, and continued to amass countless centuries in Canadian cricket.

Best described as a dour, disciplined, patient batsman, Les exhibited tremendous powers of concentration and, quite simply, he hated to lose his wicket. Modern day West Indian batsmen would do well to develop some of his traits.

In 1984, Les was diagnosed with cancer of the spine. His doctor told him he would never walk again, and that he had played his last cricket match. As we all know, not only did he walk again, but up to 3 years before his death, he was playing the game he loved. His doctor could not have known of the man's indomitable spirit and courage. He played the innings of his life and lived another 19 years before the great umpire lifted the bails.

Les was a credit to his old school, his country and above all his family. We extend our condolences to Elaine and his sons Marvin, Jamie, Scott, Andrew and their respective families. It was a pleasure and a privilege to have known Les. I shall always treasure the many hours we spent talking and watching cricket (via satellite in the latter years).

George Leslie Wight died peacefully on January 4/04. May his soul rest in peace.

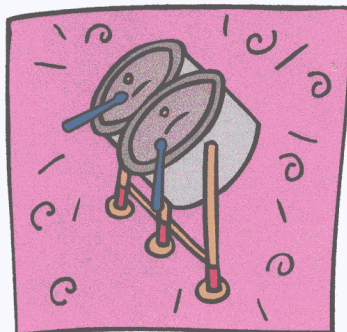
