PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2007 - 2008

This has been a year of a very active and involved (and sometimes contentious) Executive, which is all positive as it means that everyone was trying to do his best for the school. I want to touch on certain highlights of the year.

Last year, I mentioned that I was looking for the Association to move into a new direction, one of more personal volunteering. I saw four outstanding examples of this, two of whom are alumni and the other two with no direct connection to the College but, yet, volunteering their services.

The first is John Choy, an alumnus and a previous Master at the College, who, though now retired from teaching in Canada, nevertheless volunteered to go back to Guyana to teach the Sixth Form for a year. He returned to Canada with very positive reports on his work at the College, and he has since returned, at the request of the BOG, to spend another (and final) year teaching there. As you are aware, the conditions in Guyana are not as good as those in Canada (especially with respect to salaries), and John is to be commended for his willingness to spend two years of his retirement helping the children in Guyana.

The second alumnus is John Sparrock who also is retired and resides in New Jersey. When I discovered a few years ago where John was, I started active communications with him and kept him apprised of our activities on behalf of the College. A couple years ago, he decided not to sit on the side-lines but to get actively involved with helping us, even though he is at a disadvantage of not living near Toronto. He was instrumental in the efforts to improve our web-site and e-mail communications, and he has been very active working with the IT people in Guyana in trying to improve this area for students and staff at the College, even investing his own money to do so.

The third person is Michael Annamunthodo who is actually an alumnus of Q.C. but who nevertheless volunteered to spend three weeks at the College, instructing teachers at

the College in improving their level of knowledge of IT.

Finally, there is Amanda Dindayal, Canadian born-and-raised of Guyanese parents, who had never been to Guyana but who spent the best part of two months this summer in Guyana completing a feasibility study for us and providing other help at the College.

On behalf of the Toronto Association, I wish to express our sincere thanks to these four persons for their shining examples of volunteering.

We held our usual fund-raising events this year, from which we raised a record-breaking amount of just over \$56,000. I want to comment on just two, the Walk-in-the-Park event and the Golf Tournament.

The Walk-in-the-Park was a new event for us this year, and was held in Taylor Creek Park on the last Sunday in May. We raised some money, not a lot but enough to prove to us that this event has the potential to be a big money-earner. We got our feet wet this year, and I expect bigger and better things for this event next year.

The Golf Tournament has been going on for quite a few years now but, not being a golfer, this year was the first one I personally attended (getting up at 5:30 in the morning to get to the golf course by 7:00 is not one of my favourite things!). I almost did not make it as I got lost in the heavy fog which delayed the start of play by almost three hours. What I witnessed was a well organized and run event which was sold-out and very popular with lots of good prizes being offered.

I wish to congratulate the organizers of these two events for their fine efforts. This does not detract from the efforts made by everyone else in successfully running our other fund-raising events. A hearty congratulations to one and all, especially as we did raise a record-breaking amount.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 2008

The Annual General Meeting of the Association was held on Sun. 28 Sept., 2008, in the Association's meeting room at 4544 Sheppard Ave. E., Toronto. Reports on the activities of the concluding year were presented by the President, Treasurer, and representatives of the various sub-committees of the Executive. In his acceptance speech, the in-coming President thanked the alumni for their continuing faith and confidence in re-electing him to this position, and welcomed the newly-elected members of the Executive Committee, especially the newcomers who he expected will bring new vigour and a much-needed breath of fresh air to the Executive by offering new ideas to enhance its past successes. While he anticipated continuing with the normal fund-raising activities, he mentioned the addition of a new event, a Membership Dance in mid-June.

The President stressed the continuing need to improve the IT environment at the College, and the on-going upgrading of the IT skills of the teaching staff which activity could constitute the initial pilot project for the creation of a School of Continuing Education. Much work has to be done on this project, including defining it, creating an initial high-level plan, getting buy-in from the BOG, possibly obtaining appropriate support from a local commu-

nity college, and finding some more volunteers for this initial stage. Depending on the volunteers obtained, VSO Canada will be approached to finance this initial stage.

The President also noted that the Executive had to make some improvements in its administrative operations. In particular, he hopes to see the successful application for charitable status for the Association, a conclusion to the project on offering financial assistance to children and grand-children of alumni members for post-secondary education, completing the new web-site to improve communications with alumni throughout the world, and a continuation of efforts to improve communications with the Alumni Association and other appropriate groups in Guyana.

A special meeting was scheduled to be held as soon as possible, either in October or early November, to clarify and set out the plans for the new Executive for the year.

The passing of Alumni

It is with sadness that we note the recent passing of two of our alumni; Hubert (Errie) Bobb-Semple in Tampa, Florida, and Eddie Rodrigues in the UK. Errie Bobb-Semple attended St. Stanislaus College in the late 1950s.

Keith Bobb-Semple reviews the life of his brother Errie below, and Alumnus Julio Faria reflects on his friendship with Eddie Rodrigues from their days at Saints, to their later years in London, England.

DR. HUBERT ERRINGTON “Errie” BOBB-SEMPLÉ

Dr. Hubert Errington “Errie” Bobb-Semple died on Thursday, October 2, 2008, at age 62 from a sudden heart attack in Tampa, Florida.

Hubert was born in Georgetown, Guyana (formerly British Guiana) on June 12, 1946, to John Stephen Bobb-Semple and the late Christabel Beatrice Bobb-Semple. At a young age, he received training in the classical music field.

Hubert immigrated to the United States in 1966. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in 1970 from Howard University of Washington, D.C. He also received a doctorate in 1978 from the Ohio College of Podiatric Medicine in Cleveland. He established a medical practice as a licensed podiatrist in Detroit, Michigan, where he lived for over 28 years before relocating to Central Florida.

He was also a long-time member of the popular Guyanese band the Telstars, and was well known for his improvised rhythms on the keyboard. In August 2008, the band’s members celebrated a 45 year reunion in Toronto, Canada. In addition to the Telstars, Hubert was also a founding member of the Etcetera Band in Washington, D.C. During the 1980s and 1990s, Hubert also traveled with several blues, jazz, and rock ‘n roll groups in the mid-western United States.

Known to many as “Errie”, Hubert was well respected and liked by his peers and friends, both in the music and medical fields. Until recently, he was associated with the Tampa Experience Works agency. He will be sadly missed by his many friends and associates.

He is survived by his father John Stephen Bobb-Semple of Brooklyn, New York; two brothers, Keith Bobb-Semple (Donna) of Hammond, Louisiana and Ron Bobb-Semple (Cecily) of Tampa, Florida, a sister, Yvette Trotman (Ronald) of Brooklyn, New York, two aunts, Alma Alexander (Walter) of San Francisco, California and Dora Enid Charles of Atlanta, Georgia, several cousins, and a host of nephews and nieces. Also, he leaves behind a step-son Nicholas Flowers, a step-daughter Shauneille Morris – both of Detroit, Michigan and a foster daughter Anita King,

Eddie, he was a good friend of mine.

Back in the middle 60s, I remember sitting, listening to music in his house, in Croal Street, with its dark polished floors. One of his big favourites then was "Help" by the Beatles, which we played over and over again in 1965. Ironic. Besides music, we shared a passion for Photography which we learnt from Father Maxwell, the eternal enthusiast for all things optical. Eddie's uncle Charles had a darkroom next door and often let Eddie use his treasured Leica M3 and Leitz enlarger.

Eddie and I often set out on long cycle rides to Subryanville. Anne Louise's and Eleanor's house was mainly Cliff Richard and the Young Ones, and the Fonsecas, mainly Simon and Garfunkle (with descant). Another short journey across to Bill Driver in Bel Air Gardens or his cousins, Keith and Arthur, was needed for the rare heavy rock music.

We had many good years of Boy Scouting, exploring the beautiful country of our birth. Fr. Darke (Darko), Fr. Parrot and Ken Khan provided the direction, and mentors like Mark McWatt, now a famous writer, helped us understand life which, in those days, was pretty simple.

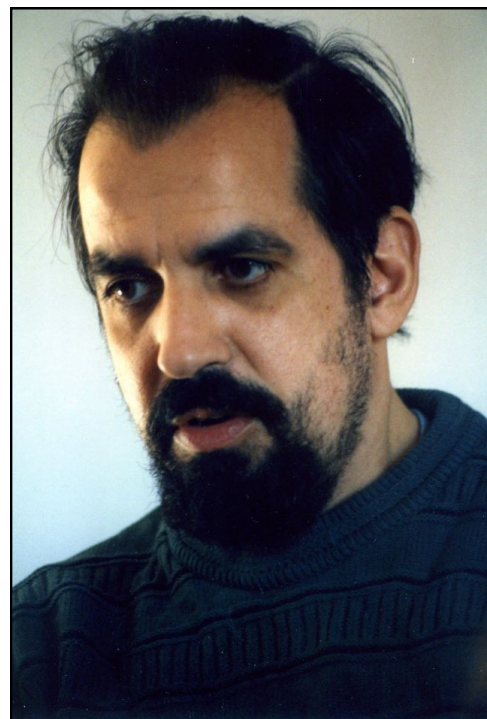
Eddie's love at Saints was Physics, encouraged by the amazing Father Feeney. He was always first in the class and he took this on to University when he entered the hallowed Halls of Imperial College, London, to study Physics in the footsteps of such famous people as Sir Alexander Fleming.

In London, life became more complex and challenging but, whenever I visited Eddie, he was in great spirits and full of enthusiasm and ideas. He graduated in Physics and chose a career in teaching which he continued in the form of coaching students right up to his illness a couple of years ago. In his mid 40s, he was blessed with a talented daughter Natasha whom he loved dearly and of whom he was so proud. Our condolences and deep sympathies go out to her and his ever loving and supportive family who took such great care of him.

Eddie spent quite a lot of time doing his own private research into "the meaning of life and the Universe", every few years his friends would receive an update on his thinking; another chapter. This was his unfinished work, like Tolkien's Silmarillion.. Perhaps by now he has found the answer, and can add that definitive completion statement, *Q.E.D.*

All I can do now is say: Eddie, we love you, we miss you, thanks for making our lives richer, and R.I.P.

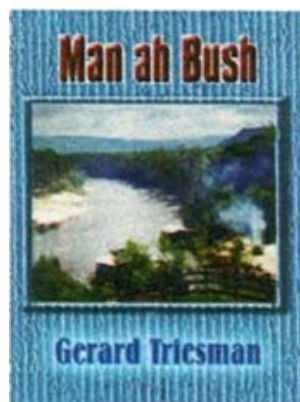
Saints Fall Dance

Gerard Triesman has uniquely chronicled his experiences in Georgetown, the old garden city, as well as in the magnificent, yet treacherous, dense jungle.

As Operating Manager of a moderate size gold and diamond mining company, he has also captured the distinct culture, characteristic of no nonsense mine workers, shop keepers, drunks and prostitutes, where bush police provide safety and visiting wardens enforce specific rules.

Gerard's final reminiscences reveal compelling reasons for his resettlement in domestic life in Canada. When an upsurge in crime, after a jail break in Georgetown, shattered the Board's comfort level, the company's direct involvement with gold and diamond mining was withdrawn.

The book, written in diary format, makes for an intriguing read.

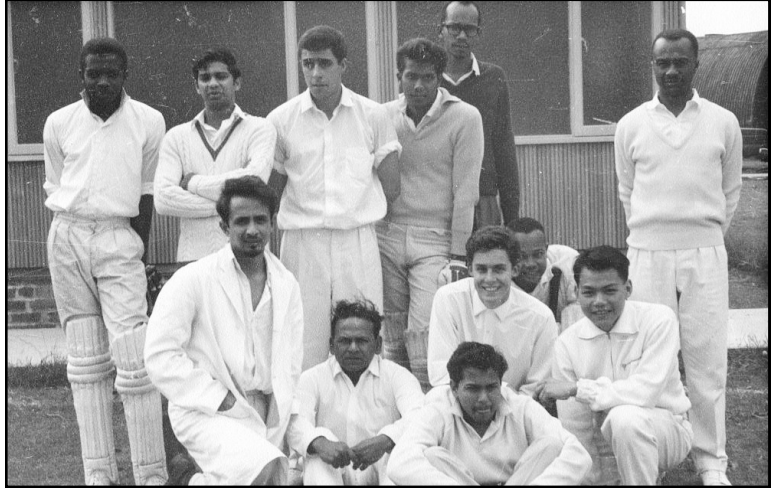

The 2008 Reunion Tour of Scotland

On the morning of August 15, 2008, a group of 6 Saints alumni, together with wives and two other guests, boarded a Whytes coach in Edinburgh to begin the 2008 Reunion Tour of Scotland. The numbers were not as high as had been expected, but this made for a more spacious ride in the coach, and made it easier to gather as a group as we travelled.

The trip was conducted by Neville Jordan and included Joe Castanheiro and wife Anne, John Yip and wife Lilly, Angus Zitman and wife Pam, and Len Yhap and wife Hoon. In addition, we were joined by two friends of Neville: Ann Johnson from Trinidad, and Dave Appleton who lives close to Edinburgh, both of whom were contemporaries of Neville during his years at Aberdeen. Neville studied Civil Engineering at the University in the early 1960s and spent most of his later years living in the Granite City, as Aberdeen is called. In Edinburgh, we were fortunate to meet with two other alumni, Dr. John Da Costa, now retired, and Dr. Stanley Moonsawmy. They both reside in Edinburgh, and are pictured above in their 'whites' some 45 years ago.

The tour began in the city of Edinburgh during the Festival, a period of fun and entertainment, with hucksters and performers in the famous Royal Mile leading up to Edinburgh Castle. We drove for several hours to Mallaig, where we took the ferry across to the Isle of Skye, enjoying the countryside and a visit to Dunvegan Castle, home of the MacLeod clan.
