The major influence in the last year (and the two before that) continued to be the effect of the COVID virus. We were unable to do anything in the 20-21 year, and the 21-22 year started out with the promise of no change. However, by early 2022, because of the steady increase in people receiving vaccinations, the epidemic seemed to be becoming under control so much so that, by the end of February, the City and Provincial governments produced plans for the preparation of the lifting of the restrictions which were imposed to stop the spread of the virus.

Our revenues for the year also included two minor fundraising events – bus trips to the casino in Niagara Falls. After also including individual donations, membership fees, and investment income, the total revenue for the year was \$77,997.09.

Our expenses for the year fell into four broad categories: fund-raising costs, operations expenses, re-investment of investment income, and aid to the College. The total expense was \$83,889.92 of which 63.4% (\$53,184.00) was

IN MEMORIAM - THE QUEEN 1926 - 2022



Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II had no close relationship to St. Stanislaus College, so there may be a question of why this article is included here.

This is not to raise a discussion of the pro and con reasons for the existence of a monarchy in today's environment or of why an independent democratic country like Canada should have or not have a monarch of another country as its Head of State.

However, the Queen was the constitutional Head of State of Canada. Also, the monarch of the U.K. was the Head of State of British Guiana, even after it gained independence in 1966 as Guyana, until 1970 when Guyana proclaimed itself as a Cooperative Republic. Further, the Queen was the symbolic Head of the Commonwealth of Nations in which both Canada and Guyana are members. Therefore, the Queen remains as a valid topic to be addressed here by an alumnus in an alumnus publication. Many expansive tributes have been paid to the Queen



over the 10 days of mourning from her death to her funeral, so there can be very little new to express here. Nevertheless, we still need to express our condolences and our appreciation of her work and responsibilities as a monarch, a mother, a grand-mother, and a great grand-mother. Here, we have a woman who had toiled unceasingly for 70 years with great dignity in full public view and without making any (or very few, if any) missteps, and had stated no desire or plan ever to retire! She died "in harness" a short two days after her last official work appointment. Who among us could say that we have either the desire or the need or the responsibility to emulate the Queen in a similar way? I would guess safely that the answer would be none! Continued on page 5


